The Programme Director of New London Architecture explains the importance of Don't Move, Improvel

What is the Don't Move, Improvel competition? How did it all begin? The competition was born from a the confection was sonty your desire to shine a light on the astonishing diversity, creativity and originality emerging from home improvement projects across London. Submissions are open to practices and homeowners who have undertaken interior insertions. conversions, back, top or side extensions and garden rooms. It's pretty unique in its celebration of this type and scale of architecture and each year it gives us both a fantastic insight into developing trends and an understanding of what people want from their homes.

Why is it important to you to why is important to your highlight home improvement projects? Ultimately it is about trying to help make people's lives better. We want to celebrate the talented architects and brave clients pushing boundaries to create spaces that improve liveability of homes and contribute to London's rich character. Don't Move, Improve! is all about encouraging great domestic and everyday design. We want to inspire and give confidence to Londoners to take on these most personal of projects, to have big ambitions and realise them.

How have the awards grown since they started? One of the best things about working on Don't Move, Improve! is engaging with our ever-growing network of architects and practices who are as passionate as we are about great domestic-scale design. It has given us a platform to support young and emerging architects and we have ambitions to do a lot more on this front. The competition has become the engine room for our year-round programme of professional and public events, exhibitions and

editorial. It's been exciting to watch the programme evolve and grow. In 2019 we had over 30,000 visitors to the exhibition and last year we were able to produce exclusive video tours and interviews with the winning projects which can be viewed at nla.london.

What are you looking for in the projects submitted? We are looking for high quality design that clearly improves life for the residents. We look for contextual designs that contribute to London's character and the life of the surrounding neighbourhood. We ask for projects that show us innovation, creativity, daring and careful consideration of materials, as well as a clear strategy for the efficiency and longevity of the buildings. Our special prizes are designed to celebrate emerging trends and key challenges: Unique Character ana key challenges: Orique Charac Prize, Urban Oasis of the Year, Compact Design of the Year, Best Under 100k, along with prizes for Environmental Leadership and Materiality & Craftsmanship.

Can you explain to us what your Virtual Design Surgeries are? We give members of the public the opportunity to get free advice from architects who have been involved in the competition, as well as other specialists like party wall surveyors. Our Design Surgery Week has gone virtual to allow people to tune in through Zoom, from wherever they are, with inspirational lunchtime webinars and one-to-one virtual consultations. It was really exciting to find out this year that one of our shortlisted projects actually resulted from one of our free design surgery consultations a few years ago!

Have there been any trends/themes that you've noticed in this year's entries? Absolutely. It's fascinating to see how the trends evolve year on year. Bold use of colour and pattern remains an ongoing theme. This year we also saw a lot of projects heroing raw materials and finishes, with bare materials and ministes, with our plaster walks, prigmented ruw concrete and exposed interior brick. We haven't seen the full impact of the work-from-home revolution yet, it's going to be really interesting to see projects responding to this in next year's entries.

Do you feel there has been a Do you feel there has been a considered shift towards renovation projects in the architectural world in the wider context, the retrojit and re-use agenda is massive. There have long been calle for the 'long-life, loose fit approach, creating sustainable buildings that have a longevity and flexibility that allows them to adapt to changing needs, remaining mindful of use of resources. At the domestic scale in London, space is a real premium and many homeowners continue to explore creative new ways to maximise the space they have rather than move.

Going forward, how do you think Don't Move, Improve! will evolve? There is a renewed energy behind the green agenda right now, which is fantastic. There's a lot more we'd like to do in this area, supporting architects and homeowners on the road to a net zero carbon London, and continuing to zero carbon London, and continung to celebrate the schemes leading the way. We have big plans to evolve our events and exhibition into a more year-round regular programme of design surgeries, socials, workshops, product displays and exhibitions. Come and say hello!

Don't Move, Improve! awards 2021: bold colours to garden offices, an exclusive preview of the shortlist

Brave, new spaces are the focus of this year's Don't Move, Improve! shortlist, says Anna White

ondrian colour palettes, garden offices shrouded in nature and the playful use of patterned concrete all feature in the most cutting-edge renovation projects London has on show this spring.

A panel of judges has whittled 200 residential <u>renovations</u> down to a shortlist of 22 final entries all competing in New London Architecture's <u>Don't Move, Improve!</u> awards 2021, and <u>Homes & Property</u> has had an exclusive first look.

The doer-upper projects range in cost from £80,000 to almost £1 million and include the total modernisation of an ex-council house in Bermondsey, a 120sq m extension in Haringey with pigmented patterned concrete, and a kitchen made from discarded milk bottles and car tires.

Between and below

Developed alongside the conversion of a house in Wandsworth, south London, into flats, this new-build home is sited on a former car park and garden. Studio Varey Architects managed the tricky planning application, obtaining permission to dig below the entire footprint of the plot to create a sunken level for the house and a new basement flat for the existing property. The four-bedroom 160sqm house includes a basement living room which leads out to a courtyard. The project cost £1.6 million, of which the house was around £600,000. (studiovarey.co.uk)



Site specific

This 258sqm four-bedroom house in Bearsden, East Dunbartonshire, was built on a long narrow plot that had been a tennis court. The house, which aims to maximise passive solar gain and reduce heat loss, has an air-source heat pump powered by solar photovoltaic panels and backed up by a small stove. It was faced with handmade bricks from Petersen Brick (en.petersen-tegl.dk) selected by architecture firm McGinlay Bell (mcginlaybell.com) for their robustness. A pavilion with glazed sliding screens opens up to the courtyards. The project received a Glasgow Institute of Architects Design Award.



Better living

Judges for New London Architecture's Don't Move, Improve! competition have whittled down almost 200 entries to highlight the 22 best home-improvement projects across London, including this extension by Alexander Owen Architecture (aoarchitecture.co.uk). Category winners will be announced from 6 May, and the overall winner on 27 May. Apply to discuss your own project in a virtual design surgery on 24 April. 

The House Recast is the overall winner of this year's contest, which is organised annually by New London Architecture (NLA) to showcase the diversity of homes in the UK capital.



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tudio Ben Allen's House Recast has been crowned the overall winner at the 'Don't Move, Improve' competition in London. The playfully colourful architecture of the home stood out to the judging panel from 22 shortlisted designs that celebrated home improvement and everyday, yet exceptional domestic design. The main prize is awarded following a string of announcements regarding sub-category wins, including gongs for working-fromhome designs and unique character. Studio Ben Allen's work topped the charts with a home that 'pushes the boundaries of how homes can look and feel', say the judges.

The 2021 shortlist for 'Don't Move, Improve' highlighted a series of projects mostly completed during a year of on-and-off lockdowns. The architects responded with fun and playful designs across London, many of them defined by colour, pattern and texture, and a sense overall lightness that brings a smile to the everyday.
